You can shuffle the words to perhaps help you see links between them. Each group is color coded. The yellow group is usually the easiest to figure out, blue and green fall in the middle, and the purple group is typically the hardest one to deduce. The purple group often involves wordplay, so bear that in mind. Select four words you think go together and press Submit. If you make a guess and you're incorrect, you'll lose a life. If you're close to having a correct group, you might see a message telling you that you're one word away from getting it right, but you'll still need to figure out which one to swap. If you make four mistakes, it's game over. The puzzle had many possibilities and intersecting groups, but I didn't have much trouble solving it. I quickly figured out that the group of words related to sand was OASIS no, and HOURGLASS seemed more correct than TIMER. After that, SURVEY gave me a way into the yellow group, and after some time thinking, both blues and purples were obvious. I solved the game quickly and easily. For today's Connections puzzle, I'll give you some clues and tips to help you solve it. The game is all about finding common threads between words, like Wordle. The solution can be found at the end of this article if you want it easily. If you prefer to try solving it yourself, keep reading for hints and strategies. Connections is a new word game from the New York Times that has become very popular on social media. It was created by Wyna Liu and is played on both computers and mobile devices. The goal is to group four words together based on something they have in common. There are 16 words, each grouped into four categories. The correct answer is unique, and players get up to four mistakes before the game ends. Players can also rearrange the board to help find connections. The game has a color code: yellow is easy, green is next, blue is harder, and purple is the most difficult. You can share your results on social media with friends. I found the game relatively easy, as SOS was a clear indicator of the yellow words, and the purple words were easily recognizable after watching season two of Squid Game. The remaining words connected logically, making it an academic win. The key to beating a killer remix lies in its ability to revamp and reimagine a good song, as seen in The Postal Service's take on "Mushaboom". This track completely transforms Feist's indie pop track into an electronica-infused masterpiece with Ben Gibbard's vocals. It's delightful and has been used effectively in various contexts. In one such instance, the author employed the remix in a presentation for a Film Art class to demonstrate how different sounds can recontextualize images. The film "Eye Myth" by Stan Brakhage is an experimental work that explores the impact of juxtapositions on interpretation.
