Our annual joyride has taken us through the showcases and early tournaments of the fall; the winter holiday tournaments; regular-season league play; more January and February holiday tournaments; league, state, disirct and regional tournaments; and finally to the USA Hockey and Hockey Canada national-championship events. The youth season concluded recently with the completion of the Esso and Telus Cup U18 national championships in Canada, leaving only Tier 1, Major Junior, Jr. A and Tier 2 junior hockey championships tobe decided. One of those junior championship boxes has been checked now with the conclusion of Centennial Cup in Canada, and both the Tier 1 USHL and Tier 2 NAHL junior champions will be crowned May 20 in the United States. The host Calgary Canucks captured the Centennial Cup, awarded to the Canadian Jr. A national champion, May 18. The Waterloo Black Hawks take on the Muskegon Lumberjacks in Game 5 of the USHL Clark Cup Finals May 19, while the defending-champion Lone Star Brahmas face the Bismarck Bobcats the same day with the NAHL's Robertson Cup on the line. In the United States, Tier 1 junior teams compete for theUnited States Hockey League's Clark Cup, while Tier 2 organizations play for theNorth American Hockey League's Robertson Cup. Canadian Hockey League Major Junior teams play for their league championshipsfirst thenconvene in Quebec later thisweek to play for the Memorial Cup. Meanwhile, the Canadian Junior Hockey League teams that capturedtheir league championships traveled to Calgary in hopes of capturing the Centennial Cup. The Centennial Cupgot underwayThursday, May 8, at 2 p.m. EDT andwas shown live on TSN4 in Canada. The Road to the Centennial Cup Here is a look at each team's Roadto the Centennial Cup: AJHL Playoffs Similar to last year, the Calgary Canucks rolled through the AJHL playoffs, compiling a 12-1 postseason record, outscoring their opponents by 37 goals and sweeping the Grande Prairie Storm in the best-of-seven AJHL Finals to win their 11thleague championship and second in a row. Because the Canucks are hosting the Centennial cup, league runner-up Grand Prairie was awarded the AJHL's automatic bid. The Storm went 8-4 in postseason play, winning eight games in a row before getting swept by the Canucks. Calgary finished first in the AJHL South Division at 37-13-2-2, while Grand Prairie was second in the North at 30-17-12-6.
