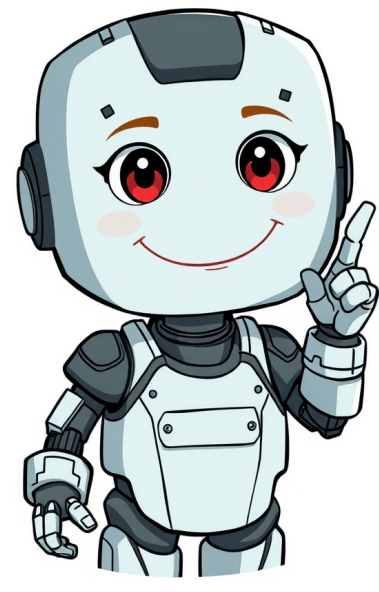

Family & Community Life How cultures interact and combine to produce something new, different, and distinctive, revealing a range of Peranakan customs, foods, languages, and beliefs.FIND OUT MORE Preparations for the inaugural exhibition of the Asian Civilisations Museum began in 1994. Storylines and themes were discussed, designers and construction companies appointed, artefacts selected and labels written. Appropriately, for a building that was once converted from a Chinese school, the permanent exhibition of the Museum began with a focus on different aspects of Chinese culture and civilisation, ranging from architecture to the connoisseurship of the literati. Later, the permanent exhibition at ACM, Armenian Street focused on showcasing the rich material and cultural heritage of the Peranakans. The ACM closed at the end of 2005 to be redeveloped as a new museum to showcase the eclectic Peranakan culture. Over the 70-year occupation of the place, several changes were made to the building. Space was differently employed and some structures were added while others demolished. Today, the old Tao Nan School has entered the latest and most colourful phase in its history – as the Peranakan Museum. Drop-off point: Accessible via Loke Yew Street and Coleman Street. Parking: Although there are publicly accessible car parks in the vicinity of the Peranakan Museum, there are alternative parking spaces nearby, such as NTUC Income Centre, Funan, Excelsior, and Peninsula Plaza. Lockers and mobile charging stations are located on Level 1, behind the Visitor Services counter. Benches are available throughout the museum on all levels. Portable, foldable stools are free to borrow at the Visitor Services counter. Service animals, including guide dogs and hearing dogs, are welcome in the museum. Visitors with service animals are encouraged to call the Visitor Services at +65 6332 7798 or email nhb_pm_VS@nhb.gov.sg at least two working days in advance. All galleries can be accessed by wheelchairs and standard-size strollers. A manual wheelchair is available for loan at our Visitor Services Counter on a first-come, first-served basis. For safety, only Personal Mobility Aids that do not exceed 120 cm in length, 70 cm in width, 150 cm in height, 300 kg laden weight, and a maximum speed of 6 km/h may be used in our galleries. Please store any loose or bulky items in the lockers at the museum lobby. Ramp access is available next to the front entrance, which will lead you to the Visitor Services counter at the Museum Lobby. All galleries can be accessed by lift. To go to galleries at level 1, 2 and 3, take the visitor lift behind the lobby. There are 2 wheelchair-friendly washrooms in the museum. On Level 1, behind the lobby On Level 3, near the lift A family friendly washroom with baby changing station and hot water dispenser is available at level 3. We welcome visitors of all abilities, including families with children and adults on the autism spectrum. To prepare for your visit, download the Social Story about what to expect while visiting the museum. Magnifying glasses are available to borrow at the Front Desk. For tour groups requiring more than 5 magnifying glasses, please call the Visitor Services at +65 6332 7591 or email nhb_pm_VS@nhb.gov.sg at least three working days in advance. (Note: Magnifying glasses should be used with great care so as not to damage any artworks or showcases in the museum. They are of little use in the museum because showcases prevent visitors from getting close enough for the magnification range.)
