The nickname was embraced by North Carolina Soldiers during the Civil War and grew in popularity as nicknamed the state and its citizens after the war. [2] History of the term Front Page of the first edition of Tar Heel, published on February 23, 1893. The newspaper was later renamed the daily heel of Alcatrão. In his early years as a colon, North Carolina became an important source of the naval stores of Alcatran, Pitch and Terebintina, especially for the Royal Navy.
